some members of the class had already served the state and country "with great distinction" as she called attention to the fact that 18 are either former or current members of a branch of the military service. In all, she said, "You have a total of 144 years military experience, including 26 years of overseas wartime service."

According to Mrs. Rell, the class includes a former member of the New York City Police Dept. and a graduate of the U.S. Navy Academy at Annapolis. She said that a review of the backgrounds of the new troopers shows that some have left other professions for careers in law enforcement. Some of the new troopers had been lawyers, teachers, commercial airlines pilots, computer programmers,

mechanics, business managers, ministers, correction officers, carpenters, firefighters, military officers, municipal police officers and sales representatives.

"You have chosen an honorable path. You have arrived at this point in your lives because you are focused, you are driven to succeed and you all have a strong desire to make a positive difference in people's lives," Mrs. Rell said.

The new troopers, who were sworn in by public Safety Commissioner Leonard C. Boyle, have been assigned to State Police barracks throughout the state. The addition of 73 troopers brings to 1,226 the number of sworn members of the State Police. ■

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Rich Clay Winner Of Full Field Golf Tourney At Tunxis

One of the hottest days of the year may be long remembered by Rich Clay as one of his best on a golf course. With the temperature in the mid 90s, Clay captured first place in the gross division of The Hundred Club's golf tournament on the White Course at Tunxis Plantation Country Club, Farmington, on Aug. 1.

Playing the challenging championship course that measures 6,241 yards, Clay shot a four-over-par 76 to capture first place in the full field tournament. A gross 76 was also turned in by Paul Vaccaro. Clay was declared winner by a matching of the score cards.

When two or more players record the same total score for 18 holes, the PGA golf professionals determine the winner by comparing the scores on the first hole. If the scores are the same, an additional hole or holes are checked until a player records the lowest score on a hole.

In a limited field event on the Green Course, past President Ralph Giansanti took first place in the gross division with an impressive 68 on the par 70 layout. Dave Ferris was second with a score of 77. The first place finish was Giansanti's third victory in The Hundred Club's events.

The state's chief executive expressed appreciation on behalf of the people of Connecticut for the study and hard work the 67 men and six women put in during the past six months.

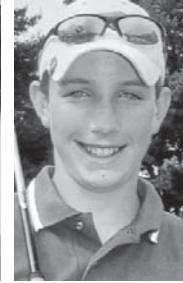
