Accident Takes Life Of Young Firefighter

A 30-year-old firefighter lost his life while enroute to a blaze at the A.D. Tripp Lumberyard in Danielson. Richard A. Cusson of Dayville, a member of the South Killingly Fire Dept., died last June 30 from injuries he suffered when his

pick-up truck struck a utility pole.

Mr. Cusson was driving near the lumberyard when he saw volunteers at the scene of the fire. Realizing that they needed assistance, he headed for the South Killingly station several miles away to get his equipment.

South Killingly Fire Chief William Auclair learned of the accident via his radio and went immediately to the site of the crash.

Mr. Cusson's death in the line of duty was the first in the history of the department, according to Chief Auclair. Mr. Cusson joined the department four years ago. His brother, Edmund Cusson, Jr., is the assistant chief and his father, Edmund Cusson, is a captain.

Mr. Cusson was born April 19, 1972 in Webster, Mass. He attended schools in Dayville and was employed by Protect Computer Supplies in Sterling. He was also associated with Fireman's Restaurant in Danielson.

A participant in pool tournaments and competitions in horseshoes, Mr. Cusson was also an avid fisherman.

Volunteer and career firefighters from throughout Connecticut attended the funeral services. Speakers praised his dedication to duty and declared that the deceased firefighter loved his uniform and was proud of his role in the department. The flag-draped casket was placed atop a South Killingly fire truck. His father and brother drove the vehicle to Sacred Heart Cemetery in Webster, Mass. where Mr. Cusson was buried.

In addition to his father and brother, Mr. Cusson leaves his mother Janet Nadolski Cusson, a second brother, Jonathan of Killingly; two sisters, Lisa Gail Cusson of Wauregan and Kara Lyn Cusson of Danielson.

Representatives of The Hundred Club have visited the Cusson family. ■

Mr. Hurley, in his remarks, hailed the work of the club's staff and two former presidents who are carrying out special assignments.

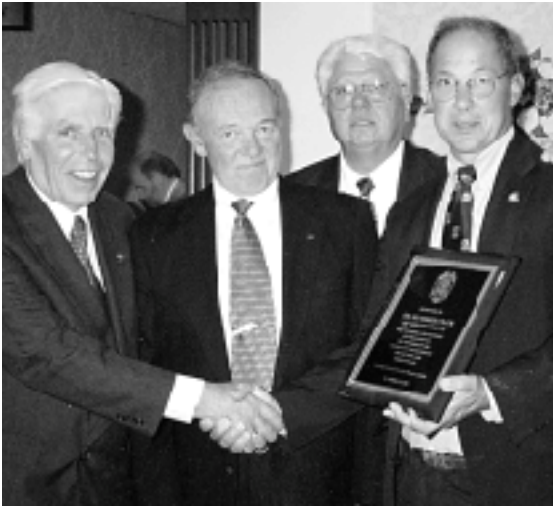

The work of Managing Director William E. Sydenham, Jr. was lauded by the retiring president. The colors were presented by members of the State Police and the Waterbury Fire Dept. Members of the State Police Pipes and Drums Corps also took part in the ceremony. Msgr. Joseph A. Devine, a life honorary member of the club, delivered the invocation and the benediction. ■

Memorial Unit Seeks Firefighters' Names

A call for all fire departments throughout the state to respond to a request for names of firefighters who lost their lives in the line of duty has been issued by Chief (Ret.) Ernest Herrick of Storrs.

Chief Herrick, chairman of the State Firefighters Memorial Committee, is asking officials in the departments to provide the names and other pertinent information related to firefighters whose names should be engraved on the memorial which was dedicated last August. He emphasized that a department which has lost a firefighter should provide the committee with that information.

According to Chief Herrick, the committee plans to have the names of the fallen firefighters engraved on the granite memorial this spring. More than 300 names are expected to be etched in the stone at that time.

Chief Herrick and Jeffrey J. Morrissette, state fire administrator, said preliminary plans call for the first memorial service to be held in October, possibly on the weekend which launches Fire Prevention Week.

The memorial is on the grounds of the Fire Training Academy in Windsor Locks. It was constructed at a cost of approximately \$400,000. The committee is continuing to accept donations. For information contact Mr. Morrissette at the academy. ■
